IN such a state of the Country, we feel it our duty to declare our firm and steady adherence to the Laws and the Constitution of our Ancestors. If by any fatal delusion, the mass, or even any great proportion, of the people, are led to cast from them, these great safeguards of their Lives, Liberties, and Properties; and, in a struggle for power and plunder, to become what their seditious leaders would make them, they cannot remain free. Those who are not bound by laws or morals, must and will be bound by force; and experience has in every instance proved, that such measures begin in the destruction of every class alike, and end in the establishment of an unsparing Despotism on the ruins of them all.

WE have thus solemnly warned our Countrymen of their danger, and we have appealed confidently to their hearts and judgments. We call on others to declare like us their opinions: and certain that their attachment to the Constitution is not less sincere than our own, we will not create discussions on minor points, when we wish to unite all the well affected in the support of every thing that is dear to us as Men and Englishmen. We disclaim unequivocally all party views and personal interests, beyond those interests which are common to us with every Class of our Countrymen, in the preservation of that Country which we love, from the impending evils of Anarchy and Confusion; and we pledge ourselves to resist, to the utmost of our power, collectively and individually, the violation or abuse of those Laws, under which it has been hitherto secure from Foreign Force, and protected from Domestic Treason.

During the erection of the Royal Stables, in Church Street, in 1809, a carpenter, who lived in Jew Street, named John Butcher, uncle to Mr. Butcher, of the present firm, Messrs. Cheesman and Butcher, chinamen, North Street, accidentally fell and injured himself. Upon his recovery, not being able to resume the heavy work of his trade, he constructed a machine of a similar make to the sedan chair, and placed it upon four wheels. It was drawn by hand, in the same manner as Bath chairs, while an assistant, when the person being conveyed was heavy, pushed behind. Its introduction was quite a favourite feature amongst the nobility, and a second fly, in consequence, was soon constructed. These two vehicles were extensively patronized by the Prince of Wales and his noble companions; and from being employed by them on special occasions of a midnight "lark," they received the name of "Fly-by-nights," and soon entirely superseded sedan-chairs, except for invalids on their conveyance to and from the Baths. Butcher, from the great success which attended his project, being desirous that his flies should have a more elegant appearance than his ability in the ornamental could effect, sent one of them, for the purpose of being repainted and varnished, to Mr. Blaker, coach-maker, Regent Street, and he, having an eye to business, purloined the design, and improved upon it by making two or three to be drawn by horses. The most remarkable vehicle of this description, for the conveyance of one passenger only, was that made for Mr. George Battcock, surgeon, who died on the 3rd of February last. It was called Dr. Battcock's "Pill Box."

Without doubt the Toy Fair, now in a wretched state of decadence, was the earliest people's festival. It was formerly held on the Cliff, between Ship Street and Black-Lion Street; but the town increasing and the Fair assuming a corresponding magnitude, Belle Vue field, whereon now stands Regency Square, was its location. From thence it was translated to the Level, where, on the 4th of September, 1807, a Sheep Fair was first held, notification of the same having been in the *Brighton Herald*, and in the *Weekly Journal*, published at Lewes, as follows: —

The rapid strides which agriculture has made within the last ten years, in this country, and the extreme utility which has been the result of its present scientific mode of practice, has commanded the attention and admiration not only of all England, but of all civilised Europe. To those who are interested in the purchase of any particular breed of stock, it must be of extreme importance that their stock be genuine and uncontaminated.

To fix, therefore, a spot where a pure unmixed breed shall always be produced, and where the purchaser (who perhaps comes from a distance) shall be sure of unadulterated stock, appears to be a great desideratum. In no instance is it more so than in that useful and highly productive animal, the South Down Sheep. Those who possess this breed, true and genuine, have had much reason to lament that at fairs, where a great variety of sheep are brought to market, many are sold for South Down Sheep which have no pretensions to be so called; and which afterwards not answering the purpose of the buyers, bring unmerited disgrace on such as are really genuine. We, therefore, the undersigned breeders of true South Down Sheep, have come to a resolution to establish a Fair, to be holden on Brighton Level, the 4th of September, 1807. And we pledge ourselves to bring to it genuine South Down Tups, Stock Ewes, Ewe Lambs, and Wether Lambs; and moreover we will not,

In the year 1771, William Mitchel, Esq. and Henry Manning, Gent., by lease and release conveyed the above-named lands to the certain new feoffees in trust that they should “yearly dispose of the moiety of the rents, issues, and profits of the premises in such manner as they or the greater number of them, together with the constables of the borough of Lewes for the time being, should by writing under their hands appoint.” William Green, Esq. was the last survivor of these trustees, and on the 10th of September, 1813, the following gentlemen were appointed feoffees of this estate: — Sir Henry Blackman, Knight, the Rev. Robert Raynes, clerk, Jonathan Harrison, John Hoper, and William Franklin Hick, Esqrs. Thomas Johnson, Thomas Woollgar, Samuel Snashall, the younger, and George Molineux, gents. Samuel Woodgate Durrant, merchant, William Lee, printer, William Figg, land-surveyor, William Marten, John Blaker, drapers, William Attwood, ironmonger.
