A WIFE THE INNOCENT CAUSE OF HER HUSBAND'S DEATH. — On Thursday afternoon¹ a coroner's inquest was held at the County Hospital, Brighton, before F. H. Gell, Esq., coroner for the Eastern division of Sussex, to inquire into the circumstances attending the death of James Hammerton, many years a waiter, and latterly a shampooer. It appeared from the evidence of the deceased's son that he had latterly been separated from his wife, on the ground of ill-usage. The witness then said:— About five o'clock in the afternoon of Saturday, the 11th inst., my father requested me to accompany him to my mother. He was rather intoxicated. He had been drinking from twelve o'clock. We went into my uncle's house together, and saw my mother. He asked her to go home. She said "No." He then said he would force her home. He then took her in his arms, and carried her out up some steps at the top of the gardens, and then across the road. My aunt and I followed him. My aunt persuaded him to return into my uncle's house. He put my mother down, and was going back with my aunt. When he had proceeded as far as the steps, my mother came behind him and wished to pass him. She said to him, "Get away, do," and pushed him gently on the shoulder; upon which, to save himself, he jumped over the steps and fell, first on his heels close to the pavement, and then on his back upon a footpath formed of gravel and comb rock. He must have jumped over five or six steps. He exclaimed, "My leg is broken." I assisted in getting him up. My mother pushed him gently, but not violently, and not as if intending to do him any mischief. I think he was on the topmost step, which is 3 feet wide. My mother was obliged to push either him or my aunt in order to pass. He was leaning with his shoulder against a wall when my mother pushed him — there was no fence to protect him from falling. I got a fly, and took him to Messrs. Blaker and Vallance, and by their advice had him conveyed to the hospital. I took off his boot before he entered the fly, and it was full of blood. I visited him three times at the hospital, and he told me he was sure his wife had no ill-will against him; that she was a very

good wife to him, and he wished her to go back to his house. He said when he got out of hospital he would give up his house and furniture to her if she wished it, and leave Brighton altogether. He died about half-past twelve on Monday night. She went to see him in the hospital about three o'clock on Monday, and continued with him till he died. We did not at first apprehend there was any danger. A verdict of Homicide by misadventure was returned.
