Mr. Stanford, late High Sheriff, was brought before the Magistrates of Brighton, by virtue of a warrant issued against him (a summons having proved ineffectual) to answer to a charge of cruelty towards a little boy, about eleven or twelve years of age, of the name of Hazlegrove, a pauper of the above parish. It appeared in evidence, that on Good Friday<sup>1</sup> the lad in question, and several others, were discovered by Mr. S. at play on a hayrick belonging to him, situate a little to the left of the road leading to Preston, and that that Gentleman immediately gave chase to, and came up with, little Hazlegrove, whom he severely beat with a walking-stick, and continued so to do until his unfortunate victim, by running across some ploughed ground, contrived to escape over a wall. A miller who was pursuing his occupation on the spot, after inquiring into the matter, advised the boy to return to Mr. Stanford and beg his pardon. This admonition was instantly acted upon; but when the little supplicant appeared before Mr. S. and implored his forgiveness, he, instead of feeling commiseration for the object before him, renewed his attack on the lad with increased violence, striking him forty or fifty times on different parts of the body. This fact was proved by Mr. Murrell, of New England Farm. Mr. Blaker, surgeon, deposed that he had examined the person of the lad, and found a considerable quantity of extravasated blood about his arms, back, loins, and thighs, which appeared to have been occasioned by some violent blows. Mr. Stanford, in his defence, said, that the boys had cut his fir-trees. — Mr. Serjeant Runnington, the Magistrate presiding upon this occasion, acted in a manner worthy of his character. After some appropriate observations upon the conduct of the accused, the Learned Serjeant dilated upon his official duty to administer justice equally towards the rich and the poor, and, in conformity with that duty, he had the parish officers bound over to prosecute Mr. S. at the ensuing Sessions, and Mr. S. himself held in recognizances to appear — himself in 100*l.* and two sureties in 50*l.* each. The boy continues very ill.

## THE ELECTIONS.

### LEWES.

The nomination here took place yesterday. From six to seven hundred persons were present, and the greatest good humour and good order prevailed. The late whig member, Mr. Perfect, was proposed by Mr. Blaker, sen., and seconded by Mr. A. Morris. The Hon. H. Fitzroy, one of Sir R. Peel's Junior Lords of the Admiralty, was proposed by Mr. Thomas Madgwick and seconded by Mr. Johnston. Mr. Godfrey Hudson, one of the new candidates, was proposed by Mr. F. H. Gill, coroner for the county, and seconded by Mr. Thomas Hillman. Lord Henry Loftus was proposed by Mr. Neale, and seconded by Mr. J. Hillman, jun. — The Hon. H. Fitzroy elaborately reviewed the progress of the nation under the gradual relaxation of duties which had taken place during the Peel administration, and declared that to carry out those reductions still further should be his object, if he were returned to parliament. He contended that he had been guilty of no betrayal of his trust to the conservative electors by whom he had been returned to parliament, quoting a definition given by Sir Robert Peel of those principles in 1838, as proof that he had adhered to what really were the grounds on which that party was based. He alleged that his opponents had put forth a protectant cry merely as a stalking-horse, their real battle being on the question of the corn-laws, which they now durst not raise in England. He referred to the *Standard* of 1845 to show by extracts that that journal was then a supporter of the Maynooth grant, on which they were now attempting to raise a cry in the country. He concluded by assuring them of his perfect success at the morrow's poll. — Mr. Perfect urged that though the whigs had postponed some measures, others of very great importance had been passed. One half the session had been occupied in relieving Ireland, and he had supported the principle of making the landlord provide for his labourers. (Cheers). He had opposed, and should oppose, a Roman Catholic

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endowment, because it would only transfer the power of the parochial clergy to friars and monks, and because Ireland had had enough money already. He referred to his votes on the poor law, as proving his wish to remedy its evils. He was certain of success, and only asked them to do their duty to-morrow. — Mr. Godfrey Hudson said he came forward to vindicate the Protestant institutions of the country. He denounced the coalition formed between a gentleman who still professed conservative principles and a whig. Lord H. Loftus was equally a supporter of Protestant principles with Mr. Hudson, whom he had only come there to assist in defeating the monstrous coalition between the whigs and conservatives. The show of hands was then taken, and declared to be in favour of the Hon. H. Fitzroy and Mr. Robert Perfect. A poll was then demanded for Mr. Hudson and Lord Loftus, and the meeting quietly broke up. There were no colours, and scarcely a drunken man was to be seen in the town.

*New Fair, for the Sale of Sheep and Lambs, of the genuine South Down Breed only, on Brightelmstone Level.*

THE rapid strides which Agriculture has made within the last ten years, in this country, and the extreme utility which has been the result of its present scientific mode of practice, has commanded the attention and admiration, not only of all England, but of all civilized Europe. To those who are interested in the purchase of any particular breed of stock, it must be of extreme importance, that their stock be genuine, and uncontaminated.

To fix, therefore, a spot where a pure and unmixed breed, shall always be produced, and where the purchaser (who comes perhaps from a distance) shall sure of unadulterated stock, appears to be a great desideratum. In no instance is it more so, than in that useful and highly productive animal, the Down sheep. Those who possess this breed, true and genuine, have had much reason to lament, that at fairs, where a great variety of sheep are brought to market, many are sold for South Down sheep, which have no pretensions to be so called; and which afterwards not answering the purpose of the buyers, bring unmerited disgrace on such as are really genuine. We therefore, the undersigned breeders of the true South Down Sheep, have come to a resolution to establish a Fair, to be holden on Brighton Level, the 4th day of September, 1807. And we pledge ourselves to bring to it genuine South Down Tups, Stock Ewes, Ewe Lambs, and Wether Lambs; and moreover we will not, knowingly, either ourselves introduce, or suffer to be introduced, to this fair, any but what shall be of the genuine, and true South Down breed: W. Stanford, J. Vallance, W. Murrell, W. Scrase, J. Hardwick, R. L. Dyer, H. Fuller, J. Chatfield, R. Verrall, T. Scrase, N. Blaker, W. Gorringe, W. Hodson, T. Beard, T. Lidbetter, S. Croskey, J. Pilfold, T. Hodson, J. Hamshar<sup>2</sup>, W. Falconer, J. Bull, N. Hall, — Bine, J. Marchant, W. Page, R. Hart, J.
