DOM JOAN DE CASTRO to the EARL OF ESSEX.

1598, Oct. 15/25. - On the 19th of last May, I ventured to send to you by a certain Englishman named Blacar, a letter in certain matters concerning England and Portugal.<sup>1</sup> I have had no reply, doubtless through your Excellency's absence from Court, and because negotiations were going on. But now that the Queen will make no peace with the Spaniards, I write again to ask you to give me a hearing. No Portugues of all those dispersed through these regions can treat of such matters more usefully, more faithfully, or, under favour let it be spoken, more prudently than myself. There is no one of nobler origin, or with kinsmen and connexions in Portugal more highly placed.

Few indeed among us now are found faithful. All are either open favourers of the Spanish king, or they do corruptly pretend to faithfulness, being really his most secret spies in this realm, in England and in Holland. Surely then I am worth giving one hearing to; I am ready to remain a prisoner, in pledge for my words. I only lack your permission to visit you in England, and the means to remove thither from Paris. - Parisiis, vigesima quinta die Octobris, anno 1598.

## LEWES FAT STOCK SHOW.

The Christmas Exhibition of Fat Stock for premiums took place at Lewes, on Tuesday<sup>5</sup>, concurrently with the usual fortnightly stock market.

The market was meagrely supplied; the buyers were numerous. Beef sold at 3s. 6d. to 4s.; mutton, at 4s. 4d., to 4s. 8d.; the very best bringing “a large 5s.” The prize sheep fetched an additional figure.

The Show, compared with former years, was a very sorry affair. In the cattle classes there was competition and that was all. A dozen sheep constituted the “Show” in the mutton portion of the exhibition; and this in the very heart and centre of the South Down district! In the porcine department, omitting a few animals shown as extra stock, there was only a escape from solitariness.

The show dinner was this year at the star. Between 50 and 60 sat down to an unusually well served table. J. Day, Esq., occupied the chair; Mr. T. Saxby (of Firle), was vice-chairman.

Among the company were, R. W. Blencowe, Esq., J. G. Blencowe, Esq., H. Blackman, Esq., Captain Longley, Messrs. G. Mulineux, jun., J. Blaker, T. Ellman, A. Lanford, H. Catt, A. Denman, A. Denman, jun., J. P. Gorringe<sup>6</sup>, W. S. Colegate, &c.

The prizes were awarded as follows:

OXEN. - Best 5 year ox, Mr. W. Saxby; second, Mr. James Gorringe. Ox or steer 4 years, first (*Brighton Gazette* prize) to Mr. Josiah Pitcher; second, Mr. W. Verrall; Mr. A. Denman’s steer highly commended; Sir J. V. Shelley’s short horn steer, shown as extra, commended. Best 4 year

cow, Mr. Denman; second, Mr. E. Cane. Best open heifer, Mr. Goringe<sup>7</sup>; second, Mr. J. Catt, of Firle.

SHEEP. - South Down Wethers, 2 years and under 3, Sir. J. V. Shelley, and J. Sheppard, Esq., Folkington. Wethers under two years, Mr. Scott Hayward, and Sir J. V. Shelley.

PIGS. - Best Sow (*Sussex Express* prize), Mr. Stenning Beard. Some pigs exhibited by Sir J. V. Shelley, Mr. Stenning (White Hart, Lewes), and Mr. Garnham, as extra stock, were highly commended.

“Mr. J. Gorringe and the successful Candidates” was proposed by the chairman.

Mr. Gorringe believed he had got what he ought to have, according to the quality of the animals; and he shouldn't die because he had been beaten by his neighbour. - (Laughter.) - But this he could tell Mr. Saxby, that if he and his animal lived till next year, he would show something like an ox, - he meant one of his own breeding; and if Mr. Saxby then beat him, why, he must have a good un. - (Hear, hear.) - ext year, his friend Saxby should'nt come off victorious with a second rate ox. - (Laughter.)

“The Unsuccessful candidates” was the next toast, the Chairman remarking that a good friend of his once showed a steer; and the advantage of his coming out was, that the animal he prided himself upon in the solitude of his own farmstead proved to be rather a sorry brute. - (A laugh.)

The toast was drunk, but the toast remained without the usual response.

The Chairman enquired if the unsuccessful had all bolted?

“I believe they were all successful,” said Mr. Davy (the Secretary); “every one that showed, I believe, obtained a prize.” - (Laughter.)

Chairman - I think we might adopt the racing rule; unless so many start, no public money will be given. - (A laugh.)

Mr. Blencowe, admitting that he was the unfortunate individual who produced the sorry brute, claimed the privilege of proposing a toast. It was one in which he knew all would join him, for it was the health of their good and excellent “Chairman.” - (Cheers.)

## ENGLAND AND WALES.

### BILLS OF SALE.

A BILL of SALE is an assignment of personal chattels, enabling the grantee to seize the goods comprised therein, with or without notice, and either immediately or at any future time. By the Act 41 and 42 Vict., c.

31, the term "Bill of Sale" includes inventories of goods with receipt attached, and receipts for purchase moneys of goods where they remain in the vendor's possession; and also agreements to give a Bill of Sale.

To be of use against execution creditors and trustees in bankruptcy, all such documents must be signed in the presence of a solicitor, and be registered within seven days from the making thereof. Property comprised in Bills of Sale do not form part of a bankrupt's estate, but are protected for the grantee. Bills of Sale cease to be valid at the expiration of five years unless they are re-registered.

### BILLS OF SALE.

A BILL OF SALE is an assignment of personal chattels, enabling the grantee to seize and sell the same according to the terms of the document. Bills of Sale are of two kinds - 1.

A Bill of Sale given by way of security for the payment of money comes within the Act of 1883. If for less consideration than £30 it is wholly void, and to be valid it must be framed as a mortgage strictly in accordance with the statutory form of deed; must be attested by a credible witness; must be registered within seven clear days of its execution; and must "truly" state the consideration and contain a schedule. Unless the deed complies with these requisites it will be void as against the grantor himself as well as against his creditors. If, at the commencement of his bankruptcy, the goods so secured are in the grantor's possession, order, or disposition, in the way of his *trade or business*, with the consent of the true owner, they pass to the trustee. Only the goods specified in the schedule can be protected as against creditors. There can be no sale or removal of the goods assigned until five clear days after their seizure. 2. Bills of Sale *not* given by way of security for the payment of money, such as absolute bills, post-nuptial settlements, and the like, still come under the Act of 1878 only. They must, therefore, be attested by a solicitor, and be registered within seven clear days. They can affect future property, and need no schedule. Both kinds require re-registration every five years, but neither are good against the landlord.
