ARRIVAL OF LOUIS PHILIPPE IN ENGLAND.

The ex-King and Queen of the French arrived, at Newhaven, yesterday (Friday).

...

DEPARTURE OF THE EX-KING AND QUEEN FROM NEWHAVEN.

As soon as his Majesty had concluded breakfast, yesterday (Saturday) morning¹, he was apprised by Mr. Packham that a large party of ladies and gentlemen from Lewes were anxious to have the honour of congratulating him upon his safe arrival. With great courtesy he appointed an immediate meeting in the great room of the hotel, to which the company resorted. Upon entering the room, Mr. Blaker addressed his Majesty as follows:- "The large party of ladies and gentlemen in this room have come from the ancient and loyal town of Lewes, to congratulate your Majesty upon your arrival on these shores; and we trust that neither your Majesty nor your royal consort have experienced any evils from your hazardous and dangerous passage."

His Majesty immediately responded, "I thank you most heartily for your kindness. You know I have always been a friend to England, and I am now come to seek shelter and security in these dominions under her Gracious Majesty your Queen."

His Majesty then, with considerable pleasureable excitement, reiterated his thanks, and shook each of the company heartily be the hand.

Immediately afterwards his Majesty retired to a carriage which was waiting for him, and, with the Queen, they proceeded amidst the acclamations of hundreds of persons who were assembled - by whom the

carriage was attended - to the railway station, where a special train was waiting. Here again he was enthusiastically received.

At eleven o'clock the train, with the illustrious party, started for London, pulling up for a few moments at Lewes, where he was again heartily cheered by those who were assembled on the platform. The train then left for London *via* Keymer.

As his majesty passed along the passage at the hotel at Newhaven to the carriage, Dr. Cary's scholars presented him with an address of congratulation, which his Majesty accepted with much pleasure.

It was not expected at Lewes that his Majesty would have left Newhaven so early, and consequently no preparations were made for his reception.

MARRIAGE OF MISS FITZCLARENCE AND VISCOUNT FALKLAND.

An Act was passed (18 and 19, Car. II. c. i.) “for raising Moneys by a Poll, and otherwise, towards the maintenance of the present war.” It contained a grant to the King of 20s. in every £100 of personal estate. Servants, men and women, were to pay 1s. out of every 20s. they received in wages; and every person was to pay 1s. above the other rates, paupers alone excepted. Aliens were to pay double what they would have been liable for had they been natural born subjects. Payments were to be made in addition according to rank. A Duke £50; a Viscount, £25; the eldest son of a Viscount of 21 years of age, £17 10s., &c.

The following gentlemen were appointed Commissioners for Sussex under this Act:- “John Ashburnham, Edward Blaker, Henry Brunhard, Esqrs., George Edmonds, Captain John Eversfield, John Backshall, gent, Edward Cooper, Esquire, John Mitchell, Francis Gratwicke, Esquires.”

In 1803 Huntington's friends, the Blakers, became, like so many other Sussex folk, nervous on account of the threatened Napoleonic invasion. Writing on 3rd November, Huntington says, "I purpose, if God permit, to slip off on Tuesday next³, and to preach on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday evening to them, for they are all under great alarms, being so near the sea coast, and our sworn enemy is daily expected to make his attempts upon us. But the Captain of our salvation will keep the field for His saints, the new man of grace cannot be killed; nor can those be plundered of their property who have God for their portion."

Death of William Blaker, Dec. 10, 1804.

In the following year⁴ William Blaker's health declined, and as the winter drew to a close it was evident that he could not recover. One morning his daughter Elizabeth, who sat up with him, said, "You were very ill yesterday." "Yes," he said, "I was; but what I felt nobody knows. The rays of light upon me were as the glory of Lebanon.⁵ I cannot describe the glory that shone upon me." The Sussex streams were locked in ice, the skies were dark and sullen, but the soul of the God-fearing, simple-hearted William Blaker reposed under an unflecked firmament in transplendent sunshine. Seeing his elder daughter standing at the bedside sobbing, he said, "My dear, we should not sorrow as those who have no hope."⁶

On receiving the news of Blaker's serious condition, Huntington, who was himself unwell, laid the letter before God, and knelt down with the intention of praying that so useful a life might be spared, but feeling "a bar" on his heart, he did not pray that prayer.⁷ On rising from his knees he said to Lady Sanderson, who had just called, "William Blaker will surely die."

Then came the news that the sick man was a little better. "He will relapse," said Huntington, "for he will never rise any more;" then, though unwell himself, he ordered his coach, and set off post for Bolney. On the way, however, he heard that Blaker was dead, and his own health being so indifferent, and the cross-country roads being, in consequence of the wet weather, almost impassable by carriage, he at once returned to London.

OLD WESTMINSTERS v. MARLOW.

These clubs played a match on the Crown ground, Marlow, on Whit-Monday¹⁰. The visitors opened the batting, and, aided considerably by the number of catches missed, accumulated the large total of 274. Eight of the Marlow team had a turn a bowling, of whom Coleman took four wickets for 65, W. H. Lunnon 3 for 85, R. A. Lunnon 1 for 30, Langley one for 11, and Wethered one for 8. Marlow made but a very poor show with the bat, being apparently frightened at the slows of Fox, the Kentish veteran, who captured seven wickets for 45. The only respectable score was that of Langley, who made 51 of the 89 scored. Gunnery took 3 wickets for 16. Tritton also bowled, but unsuccessfully, 25 being scored from him for no wicket. Following on, the home team in their second innings made 118 for the loss of 4 wickets, when the stumps were drawn. Newton played a fine innings of 64 (not out), and Milman 21 (not out). Score:-
